

Outages

99.77% of customers experienced NO OUTAGES during the week of February 27- March 5.

For the week, there were 351 outage incidents, affecting 3,145 customers.

- Full and partial circuit outages affected customers mostly in Brentwood, Green Meadows, Westwood, Pico-Robertson and Hyde Park.
- Transformer outages affected customers mostly in San Pedro, Century City, Highland Park, Sun Valley and Westwood.

Commercial Customers Save Energy and Money with CLIP Program

LADWP's Efficiency Solutions group paid \$54,570 in incentives to 15 commercial projects in mid-February that took advantage of LADWP's Commercial Lighting Incentive Program, or CLIP. CLIP provides rebates to commercial customers for the installation of newly-purchased, energy-saving lighting and controls. The 15 lighting upgrade projects are estimated to save 317,025 kilowatt-hours, equivalent to 34 automobiles taken off the road for one year. Go to www.ladwp.com/CLIP for details.

LADWP's La Kretz Campus Honored with Design Award

The La Kretz Innovation Campus (LKIC) has been chosen as one of five recipients across the country for the 2017 Rudy Bruner Award for Urban Excellence. A national review panel is currently conducting site visits to determine which of the award recipients will receive the top honor. The Gold Medalist will receive \$50,000 and the four Silver Medalists will each receive \$10,000 to enhance their projects. The Rudy Bruner Award is a design award recognizing transformative places that contribute to the economic, environmental and social vitality of American cities. Envisioned as an industry hub for the promotion and development of clean technologies, La Kretz is a place where LADWP customers – residential, commercial and industrial – can learn about existing and envisioned technologies and programs intended to save energy, water and money.

Eastern Sierra Sees Second Wettest Year on Record

LADWP hydrographers completed their March snow course surveys, providing a more accurate picture of our current precipitation conditions. The snow measurements show, this water year is the second wettest year on record in the Eastern Sierra, after 1969. As of March 7, the snowpack in the Eastern Sierra, the source of a portion of LA's water supply, stood at 253 percent of average for this time of year, with 53 inches of water content, once the snow melts. Meanwhile, the total rainfall in LA is a cumulative 19.34 inches, 158 percent of where it should be for this time of year. LADWP hydrographers will conduct another snow survey in late March, early April.

CA-Friendly Landscaping at LADWP Facilities

So far this calendar year, four LADWP facilities with traditional lawns have been re-landscaped with water-conserving, drought-tolerant plants and other decorative features. The makeovers are part of a continuing effort by LADWP to replace turf at all its facilities in order to conserve water. The four facilities transformed this year are projected to save more than 1.1 million gallons of water annually. The two most recent projects were completed in early March at Receiving Station H, located at 936 North Poinsettia Place and Distributing Station 17, located at 2904W 11th Street.

LA Schools Save the Drop

On March 7, LADWP and the Los Angeles Unified School District (LAUSD) awarded special plaques and prize checks to K-12 Los Angeles schools who were winners of the first-ever LADWP/LAUSD Water Conservation Contest. The competition encourages conservation and promotes drought awareness through the development of an action plan implemented on school grounds. LAUSD provided funds to the winning projects. LADWP provided in-kind support with collateral materials including the Save the Drop awards manufactured in-house by our very own woodshop! A total of 12 schools were awarded, each receiving a check for \$10,000. Overall winners from each grade level: elementary, junior high and high school, received a check for \$50,000.
